Album / Title

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60s—Decade of Change—Cuca Records

After completing our first LP in Minneapolis for the Pleasant Peasant label, we began a new series of recordings. This series of records was made in Wisconsin, in Sauk City at Jim Kirchstein's Cuca Records. It was 1965. It was also the first time in a long while with a new face in the band.

Dallas Larson joined the band in 1964 on sax and clarinet when Roger Barnetzke left the band. Dallas had been helping out on trumpet when Ray Rhyner got the night shift at the Wausau Post Office, so he joined the band on a regular basis. He was a music teacher and had recently moved to Wausau.

The album at this session was entitled Here's Jerry! K-2038. This album sold well on the job and at Jerry's store, so much so that we were able to go back to Cuca 2 years later in 1967. This one was called I Stopped For A Beer, K-2059.

Again we had a change in personnel. Charlie Rogers was now living in Rhinelander and traveling the additional distance for gigs was becoming too much. Replacing him at Tenor Sax and Clarinet was Lyle (Bucky) Buchholtz of Merrill, WI. Charlie was on the first album and Bucky as on the second.

The tunes on these two albums reflect a slight shift in style of the Goetsch band to a more Nebraska Czech style moving slightly away from the "Romy Gosz" sound common in the Manitowoc area. The impetus for this shift resulted from arrangements Ray Rhyner made by revising charts we purchased from a defunct Czech-style band in Chicago. It represented fresh "old" tunes for us in that time period.
